
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SUPERB STATUARY FOR PANAMA-PACIFIC INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION, SAN FRANCISCO, 1915.

Last of County \$3,500,000

Highway Issue Is Spent

With the completion of the work on the Chatsworth grade road, the last lap of the construction work authorized by the good roads bond issue four years ago, when \$3,500,000 was raised for better roads in this county, will be reached.

Approximately 300 miles of the best roads now course through the county, making it one of the leading good roads sections of the United States.

The last stretch is less than a mile in length, and will cost \$25,000. The new highway will cross the Southern Pacific tracks over the Chatsworth tunnel avoiding a very dangerous intersection. The Southern Pacific Railway company will contribute \$5000 to the work on this piece of work.

The money appropriated for the goods roads by the bond issue of four years ago will be entirely exhausted

COUNTY ANNOUNCES

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS

The following examinations for positions in the county civil service have been announced by F. E. Doty, secretary and chief examiner of the county civil service commission.

February 21—Apprentices in the mechanical trades, including carpentering, steam fitting, electrical and mechanical work. Examination open to boys from sixteen to twenty-one years. Salary not to exceed \$2 a day.

February 24—Curator and assistant curator of arts for county museum.

February 25—Graduate nurse for county hospital; salaries \$60 to \$75 a month.

February 25—Transit men, instrument men and surveyors for service with county surveyor.

GOOD ADVICE

The following very good advice is going the rounds of the newspapers:

If you find a piece of mail in your box at the postoffice addressed to some other party, hand it back without delay to the officials. Don't carry it away or read it. The offense is punishable by fine or imprisonment or both. This is a recent ruling of the postoffice department at Washington. The receiver of mail should examine it before taking it from the postoffice. The ruling applies to newspapers as well as letters or postal cards.

Newport News: The drillers at the Collins oil well at the head of the bay have passed through a ten foot strata of oil sand heavily impregnated with light oil. The formation just below the strata was shale which is a good indication. A thicker strata of oil is expected at any time. The well would produce about 20 barrels a day at the present time according to G. W. Kellogg, an experienced oil driller, who has worked on the hole.

Road experts who have visited the county and observed the work; have all declared, that macadam roads in Southern California should be among the longest lived of any in the world, as the weather conditions here are considered best for petroleum dressed roads.
