WATER POWER

DURING the war the War Industries Board made a study of the cities of the United States to find where war contracts could be placed. In every instance power was the necessary requirement for the placing of contracts of a size which in some instances turned a village into a city and a city into a metropolis. Where power was lacking there municipal growth ceased.

It power is lacking in California or in any city of California during the next decade the growth of that city must automatically cease.
