

NEW DANA PICTURE IS FULL OF THRILLS

It is an entertaining story of love, opium smugglers and secret service agents that Viola Dana presents in her latest picture, "There Are No Villains," a Bayard Veller production for Metro, which comes to the Torrance Theatre Wednesday, April 12.

The picture gives some intimate glimpses of that part of San Francisco known as the Barbary Coast district, one of the most notorious sections along the Pacific. In her various characterizations as a member of the Federal secret service Miss Dana is excellent and keeps the audience wondering what hair-breadth escape will be next.

It is the story of an attempt by Uncle Sam's sleuths to capture a daring band of opium smugglers through the medium of a female detective, who becomes a stenographer, the man who is snuppoused to be implicated with the gang, later going as nurse to one of the supposed members of that gang, when, with everything seemingly working successfully, love steps in and the carefully laid plans are all upset.

Gaston Glass made a fine secret service operator, while Edward Cecil was convincing as the respectable business man who arranged for the smuggling. Others in the cast were DeWitt Jennings, Fred Kelsey and Jack Cosgrave. Mary O'Hara adapted it from Frank P. Adams' story. John Arnold was photographer and A. F. Mantz art director.

REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The committee on school activities arranged for the board of education of Los Angeles to visit this city and look over the situation, and the following members of the board met the committee at the school house Friday, March 31: Mrs. Susan M. Dorsey, Mrs. Jessie York, M. C. Bettinger, Irwin J. Muna and C. E. Seaman. After looking over the addition to the school building which had been constructed since the last visit of some of the members of the Board they walked out to the property which they will be asked to purchase for the proposed high school building, auditorium, shop, athletic field, etc.

A very tasty luncheon was awaiting them at McKinley Inn where after the repast the needs of Torrance from an educational standpoint were presented by George A. Proctor, Alfred Gourdier, P. G. Briney, Prof. Barnett, Dr. J. S. Lancaster, R. R. Smith, G. W. Neill, J. M. Fitzhugh, W. C. VonHagen, and A. W. Malone.

After considerable discussion the president of the board authorized Geo. W. Neill to give the board of education an option approximately 17 acres of land adjacent to the present school building. Upon being pressed for a statement as to the amount of money Torrance could expect from the present Bond Issue, the president of the board stated that it was absolutely impossible to give a definite statement of the exact amount in dollars and cents that would be expended here.

Mrs. Dorsey, superintendent of schools stated that the amount of the bond issue was based on the estimates received from the various school districts and the fact that the needs were constantly changing made it imperative to shift money from one district to another and that in view of the fact that Torrance's needs are so imperative it was deemed advisable to expend from \$150,000 to \$175,000 here.

The board of education complimented the committee on the comprehensive and detailed report of the school situation which was sent to them, and stated further that it was the best report they had ever received.

Two-thirds of all ballots cast must be marked "yes" on the bond propositions.

If you go to the polls and vote for city officials you cannot prevent your vote from counting one way or the other on bond propositions, for if you do not mark your ballot on the bond questions it will count a "NO" on both bond propositions. Two-thirds of all votes cast must be "YES" on the bonds.


