A DISGUISED TAX.
The proposal before congress for the stamping of a federal number on automobile engines and bodier as a supposed safeguard against theft, the cost being assessed at two dollars, to be collected from each auto owner, is of course merely another auto tax in disguise. De-spite the assertion that it will pro-ject owners just the same as they once protected themselves by brand-ing their cattle and horses, there is no assurance whatever that the stamping of another number on machines would deter thieves any more than the stamping of the original numbers by the makers, which are made a part of the state license list. Experience in the bootlegging field has shown that the determined law-breaker is no more afraid of breaking a federal law than any other. It used to be that a man inclined toward crime flouted the laws of the towns and cities and even the state, but stopped with a sudden jolt before breaking one of Uncle Sam's laws. That time has passed, and today the man bent upon breaking a law doesn't show any more respect for a federal law than he does one enacted by the state. We can see nothing to the proposed auto num-ber law but another chance to gouge auto owners.

AFTER THE RECKLESS.
Virginia is trying out a new law, and one that is going to be watched with close interest. It provides that every motorist, on approaching a railroad crossing outside the cor-porate limits of a town or city, must come to a full stop not less than ten feet nor more than 100 feet from the nearest rail. Failure to observe this law is punishable by a fine of \$10, and the money so collected goes into the treasury of the county in which the fine was assessed. We believe auto drivers here are as careful as are to be found anywhere, and yet many of them take unnecessary chances at railroad crossings. They will not all endorse the Virginia law, of course, because it means stopping and starting the auto more often than they are now compelled to do. But we believe that those who realize that it is better to stop for a minute than to get ground up and stop forever, will declare that the law seems to possess considerable merit.
