A LETTER FROM HOME
 "No matter how busy I may be
 when the mail comes which brings
 my home-town paper, I've always
 got a few minutes to spare for it,"
 writes a former resident of this city
 now living in the East.
 We have had many such state-
 ments as this, and we know every
 man and woman in this community
 who was born and raised elsewhere,
 likes to get hold of a paper from
 that particular part of the country.
 It is human nature to want to keep
 in touch with old friends, and to
 want to know what is going on in
 the old home county. That is why
 every weekly newspaper in this land
 has on its subscription list names
 of residents of our larger cities or
 residents of distant states. They
 may not get back home often, pos-
 sibly never will again, but they al-
 ways feel in their hearts a some-
 thing, when the old home is men-
 tioned, that can hardly be explain-
 ed.

Think over your acquaintances
 and we dare say you will recall away
 out somewhere one who would con-
 sider the weekly visit of this news-
 paper as good as a letter from
 home. It or she may never get
 back here, but like the New York
 man, they'll have time every week
 to stop and scan the paper from the
 old home town for a name that is
 familiar to them. Think what such
 a gift would mean to you if you
 were in their place. Think how
 joyously you would repeat those
 names so dear to you if you saw
 them in black and white hundreds
 of miles away. And then think what
 insignificant sum it takes to make
 someone just as happy 52 times in
 the year as if they were receiving
 each week a long, newsy letter
 from home.

A FINE EXAMPLE
 There are children starving in
 Europe, women are suffering, and
 once strong men are breaking under
 the strain which the war has given
 them as an inheritance. We are
 comfortable here in our own land,
 and few of us have the least idea
 that conditions are at this moment
 worse in some European countries
 than history has ever recorded. Am-
 erica has heard the cry of starving
 children in Austria through Her-
 bert Hoover, and it is good to know
 that she is answering, showing that
 she can forgive a recent enemy, and
 that her big heart will not permit
 little children to starve.
 But the part of this answer which
 will strike residents here most for-
 cibly is the answer being sent by
 the armers of this nation. President
 Howard, of the American Farm Bu-
 reau, said recently in a speech at
 Chicago:

Farmers in 37 states have
 authorized me as their president
 to offer enough American-
 grown corn to feed the starv-
 ing millions of Europe, China,
 Armenia and other countries
 and I promise that the farmers
 will deliver their offerings
 promptly to the point of ship-
 ment. This treasure will come
 in voluntarily gifts of from 5
 to 3,000 bushels, many wealthy
 farmers having given as high
 as 3,000 bushels.
 All that the farmers insist on is
 the corn not be sold, but must go
 straight to the people who need it.
 The farmer is having a pretty tough
 time of it himself just now, with
 grain and hog prices declining. But
 he comes to the front when trouble
 appears, he realizes that the good
 in the world outweighs the evil, and
 he sets a mighty fine example for
 the balance of the world.

SEARCH AND SEIZURE
 Newspapers throughout the coun-
 try are devoting considerable space
 just now to discussing the new
 "search and seizure" law offered in
 Ohio the past week and which, it is
 argued may take on a national as-
 pect if favorably acted upon. It is
 generally pronounced the most rapid
 piece of "dry" legislation ever of-
 fered for enactment.

We had no desire to discuss the
 wet and dry issue here, nor have
 we space in our columns for an ar-
 gument for or against new laws
 constantly coming up as the result
 of prohibition. But we believe ev-
 ery sane man throughout this entire
 community will agree with us heart-
 ily when we say that there are cer-
 tain limits beyond which no set of
 men have a right to set foot. We
 speak of the great American home,
 and we declare that in this land
 "every man's home is his castle."
 We cannot agree that the homes of
 America should be at all times open
 to the coming and going of either a
 wet or dry army of "sniff-hounds."
 It is easy enough to cause the arrest
 of a man who permits his home to
 generate into a nuisance. But there
 is neither sense nor justice in a law
 which permits another man to en-
 ter and search a house when neither
 the facts or evidence warrants it.
 There must be a line drawn some-
 where—and the home is about the
 best place in the world for drawing
 it. For if there is anything sacred
 to us red blooded Americans it is
 our homes.
 The Ohio law would recognize no
 home as a "private residence." In
 fact, it stipulates that there is no
 such thing as a "private residence."
 And right there is where we think
 it is based on bunk and is not the
 work of a man whose brain is in
 sympathy with the great body of
 Americans.
