POUND LOAF OF BREAD

Sixteen ounces is prescribed as the standard weight of a small loaf of bread in Senate Bill 493, signed by Governor Stephens at Sacramento. Standard large loaves must weigh 24 ounces. Both weights must obtain six hours after baking.

A deviation of one ounce in excess of small loaves and two ounces for large loaves is permitted for "commercial tolerance."

Senate Bill 291, providing for the regulation of sanitary conditions in bakeries, was approved.
