SAN PEDRO-REDONDO BOULEVARD ASSURED

The State Highway Committee appointed by the Chambers of Commerce, associated with the Fourth District Chamber of Commerce, met at the State Highway Commission office in the Pacific Finance Building, Los Angeles, Wednesday at 1 o'clock p. m. Twenty-two representatives were present from the various chambers. N. D. Darlington, chairman of the Road Commission, promised as soon as they could get an engineer's crew free from other work that they will put them on a permanent location survey, and as soon as the plans can be drawn they will issue it for contract, and work will be started as soon as possible on the proposed boulevard between Redondo Beach and San Pedro along the ocean front.

Mr. Darlington also stated that it would possibly take, until the fall of 1922 before construction work would be started, and by that time as the price of construction is growing more favorable, the road could be built for about \$4,000,000.

NEW MODEL FORD

Knox, Peckham & Schultz declare the recent changes in the model "T" Ford touring car are meeting with public approval. These changes include much deeper seat cushions at a comfortable angle, which taken in connection with an added slant given to the seat backs results in greatly improved riding qualities. Structural improvements in the construction of the rear seat backs are also being pointed out by the authorized Ford dealers. In the latest cars the rear panel is removable. In case of an accident it can be quickly replaced at a very small cost, where formerly the entire rear portion of the car, from door to door, was welded together. Other improvements noted are the lowering of front bow of the top, the removal of the projection of upholstery outside the body line and a change in the manner of supporting the rear fenders that adds to their rigidity.
