EDISON CO. REDUCES RATES

Edison Co. voluntarily reduce electric charges one cent per kilowatt hour, or from the present maximum rate of nine cents to eight cents, a reduction of eleven per cent, affecting one hundred and thirty thousand consumers outside of Los Angeles, the Southern California Edison Company has announced.

Manager C. E. Houston has received advice from Vice-President M. Kennedy of the filing of the new schedules, which when approved by the Railroad Commission will become effective from and after January 1, 1922.

In a communication to District Manager Houston concerning the proposed rate reduction, Vice-President Kennedy says: "In order to do as much as possible toward reducing the cost of living, the Southern California Edison Company has been advised to make a reduction of rates for the next month."

"I am sure that there has not been a reduction in the cost of labor since the company has maintained the same rate of wages to employees, but the other hand, there has been a decrease in the efficiency of the work which has helped materially in lowering the cost of operation, making possible the reduction in rates announced."

The change in lighting rates will become effective almost immediately, and during the darkest part of the year, it will mean a considerable lowering of the light bills of all consumers on the system.

Experts are making a thorough investigation and comparison of the schedules for service to industrial and residential consumers, and it is expected that some substantial reduction will be announced in these rates of service in the very near future.
