## The Voice Of the People

Editor: We note with much satisfaction the hearty praise given you in last week's issue on the stand taken to publish a clean paper. A newspaper that goes into the home should not only be clean but should appeal to our better natures and lead to higher ideals. Were our leading metropolitan dailies stripped of their trash and rubbish they would be like a plucked owl—there would be very little meat left. Those who cater to public entertainment and recreation have it in their power to raise or lower the public's intelligence and morals. We boast of the intelligence of American citizenship, and yet a prize fight or a shady movie will draw ten times the audience that a minister or lecturer will draw.

Take the matter of our constitutional rights—our civil liberties. The average citizen seems to care no more for them than for the laws of the Medes and Persians, and yet it was not always so, for Patrick Henry only voiced the sentiments of his fellow citizens when he said "Give me liberty or give me death."

David Starr Jordan, than whom there is no greater authority, stated recently: "I am convinced that the issue of personal liberty now stands in the first rank. Wrong opinions should be met only in fair discussion. To put them down by force or terrorism or by special legislation is a policy more dangerous than any expression of opinion can be. Let crime be served as crime deserves, but let no freedom of utterance be treated as crime. The suppression of opinion, honest or otherwise, in the last two years has been one of the most humiliating episodes in the history of our country. If those with whom I disagree are not free to speak, then I, too, am muzzled."

The society that is afraid to hear its humblest member without molestation is only fit for chains and slavery." The last quotation is from Wendell Phillips. There is nothing more important in our constitution than its first amendment: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the government for redress of grievances."

Yet, in spite of this plain declaration of our constitution, we have men rotting in federal prisons for nothing but expressing their opinion about the war.
