

LONE BOYS MOURN DEATH OF FATHER, 68

Settler of Azusa Passes Away Monday

Mr. and A. W. Malone, proprietors of the Torrance Pharmacy, are mourning the death of their father, Frank Malone, who passed away Monday morning at his home in Azusa. Mr. Malone was 68 years old at the time of his death the oldest of the San Gabriel. He crossed the Pacific to California in 1859, when he was 14 years old. His father settled in El Monte, but moved several times to Azusa. The Malones are an eighth white family in the city and took active part in the organization of settlers which fought for the estate for land and water. The story of these settlers made the history of future settlement in the valley paved the way for its development. Mr. Malone at one time was under guard in Los Angeles county. He was the widow and the two sons of the late Mr. Malone left a daughter, Mrs. A. D. Spurrin, of Los Angeles and another son, Walter Malone, who died last week. A funeral was held in Azusa Monday.
