## P. E. ENGINEER WILL APPROVE CABRILLO PLAN

### Sees Need of Crossings, Curbing and Dust Elimination

That the Pacific Electric railway will improve its right of way along Cabrillo avenue by constructing crossings at Susana and Sartori streets, by building curbing on both edges of the right of way and by grading and covering with rock and oil, was the belief of Torrance business men after a consultation with George S. McClure Tuesday morning.

Secretary Harry Gadeky of the Chamber of Commerce induced the P. E. to send Mr. McClure to Torrance to consult with local men. Mr. McClure declared that the company's present policy would be against paving the right of way, but that curbing would be constructed, if Torrance interests desired it. The company engineer asserted that he would recommend the crossings and grading, as well as the placing of oiled stone along the right of way. Permission to construct the crossings must be obtained from the railroad commission, and the company must decide whether it is advisable to place rock along the right of way.

Attention of the engineer was also called to the poor condition of the tracks at the El Prado street crossing and to the weeds along the right of way on Redondo boulevard. He promised to see that the tracks are repaired and the weeds removed.

Business men believe that curbing, crossings and oiled stone will greatly improve the street.

The engineer declared that the company would not object to having the west side of the right of way paved by the city, but asserted that a double track will soon be necessary, in which case the paving would be removed.

### ORDINANCE No. 71

An Ordinance of the City of Torrance Amending Ordinance No. 50

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

**Section 1**  
Subdivision 26 of Section 11 of Ordinance No. 50 of the City of Torrance is hereby amended to read as follows:

26. For every business not herein otherwise mentioned and provided for, \$6.00 per quarter.

**Section 2**  
Section 11 of Ordinance No. 50 of the City of Torrance is hereby amended by adding the following subdivision to be numbered 27:

27. For the business of drilling for or producing from wells oil or gas a business license the amount of which to be paid by every person or company engaged in such business shall be determined as follows:

For each well being drilled or operated by said person or company \$6.00 per quarter so long as any operations are carried on in said well or production obtained therefrom.

**Section 3**  
The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance, and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, and thereupon and thereafter this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect.

### NOTICE OF AWARD OF CONTRACT

Pursuant to statute and to the Resolution of Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance directing this Notice:

Notice is hereby given that the said Board in open session on the 18th day of September, 1923, publicly opened, examined, and declared all sealed proposals or bids for doing the following work and improvement in said city, to-wit:

That the roadway between the curb lines of 222nd Street from the most westerly line of Cabrillo Avenue westerly to the most easterly line of Arlington Avenue, the western roadway of Cabrillo Avenue from the northern curb line of 222nd Street southerly to a line forty feet southerly from and parallel to the most northerly line of Plaza Del Amo, the northern roadway of Plaza Del Amo from the most westerly line of Cabrillo Avenue westerly to the most easterly line of Arlington Avenue, the roadway of Andreo and Gramercy Avenues from the most southerly line of 222nd Street southerly to the most northerly line of Plaza Del Amo, shall be graded to the official grade and paved with asphalt pavement consisting of asphaltic concrete foundation course two and one-half (2 1/2) inches thick and "National Pavement wearing surface" one and one-half (1 1/2) inches thick.

That concrete curb shall be constructed along the southern curb line of the northern roadway of Plaza Del Amo from the most easterly line of Arlington Avenue easterly to the westerly curb line of Cabrillo Avenue.

The above said work shall be done in accordance with the specifications adopted by ordinance No. 19 and known as specifications No. 1 and the plans and specifications adopted by resolution adopting specifications No. 135, all of which are now on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Torrance.

Attention is hereby directed to the "National Pavement Corporation License Mixture Agreement," dated June 19, 1923, on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Torrance, California.

That said contemplated work and improvement, in the opinion of the said Board of Trustees, is of more than local or ordinary public benefit, and said Board hereby makes the expense of said work and improvement chargeable upon a district of lands, which said district said Board hereby declares to be the district benefited by said work and improvement, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof; which said district is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point 50 feet easterly from the westerly line of Cabrillo Avenue and distant two hundred and eighty-five and forty-two hundredths (285.42) feet north of the northern boundary line of 222nd Street in the City of Torrance, and running thence southerly and parallel with the westerly line of Cabrillo Avenue to the center line of Plaza Del Amo; thence westerly along the center line of Plaza Del Amo to the eastern boundary line of Arlington Avenue; thence northerly along the said easterly line of Arlington Avenue to a point two hundred and eighty-five and forty-two hundredths (285.42) feet north of the northern boundary line of 222nd Street; thence easterly in a straight line to the point of beginning; saving and excepting from the above bounded and described area the area of all public streets, avenues and alleys contained therein.

Notice is hereby given that serial bonds to represent unpaid assessments, and to bear interest at the rate of seven per cent (7%) per annum, will be issued hereunder in the manner provided by the improvement bond act of 1915, the last installment of which bonds shall mature nine years from the second day of July next succeeding nine months from their date.
