

# TORRANCE THEATRE OFFERS FOUR MORE GREAT PICTURES

Four feature films head the bill in the coming week's attractions at the Torrance theatre.

Thomas White, the 4-year-old son of the Rev. Dr. White, Episcopal clergyman of St. Louis, Mo., where the little chap first saw the light

of day, is one of the real actors in Elmer Clifton's screen production of "Down to the Sea in Ships," which will be shown next Thursday and Friday, Aug. 30 and 31.

Shortly after his birth little Thomas' parents moved to New Bedford, Mass., where the father is one of the leading clergymen of the famous whaling town. The handsome boy was chosen by Mr. Clifton to enact the role of Thomas Allen Dexter, afterward played as a grown-up by Raymond McKee. Aside from his good looks, the boy is an exceptionally talented youngster, and a real playmate of little Elizabeth Foley.

There is an unusually effective scene between the two youngsters, in which Elizabeth, by means of a string attached to Tommy's tooth, extracts the bicuspid by means of a healthy jerk, which not only sets her youthful playmate to genuine tears, but also moves her to weep at his misery. The extracted tooth was really loose and there was no "faking" of the scene in the picture.

William Slavens McNutt created a dual personality in the person of Bat Shugrue, alias "the Gas Pipe Kid," in his story, "His Good Name," that is startling in the sense that he was a clean-cut athlete and a low crook. But the good in him overshadowed the bad in him, and the crook personality vanished. Rockcliffe Fellowes, as Bat Shugrue in "Trifling With Honor," Universal-Jewel film version of McNutt's story, which comes to the Torrance theatre Saturday, Sept. 1, offers a strong characterization of this strange figure.

### RESOLUTION OF INTENTION No. 136

Be It Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, that it is the intention of the said Board to order the following work to be done and improvement made in said city, to-wit:

That the roadway between the curb lines of 222nd Street from the most westerly line of Cabrillo Avenue westerly to the most easterly line of Arlington Avenue, the western roadway of Cabrillo Avenue from the northern curb line of 222nd Street southerly to a line forty feet southerly from and parallel to the most northerly line of Plaza Del Amo, the northern roadway of Plaza Del Amo from the most westerly line of Cabrillo Avenue westerly to the most easterly line of Arlington Avenue, the roadways of Andree and Gramercy Avenues from the most southerly line of 222nd Street southerly to the most northerly line of Plaza Del Amo, shall be graded to the official grade and paved with asphalt pavement consisting of asphaltic concrete foundation course two and one-half (2½) inches thick and "National Pavement wearing surface" one and one-half (1½) inches thick.

That concrete curb shall be constructed along the southern curb line of the northern roadway of Plaza Del Amo from the most easterly line of Arlington Avenue easterly to the westerly curb line of Cabrillo Avenue.

The above said work shall be done in accordance with the specifications adopted by ordinance No. 19 and known as specifications No. 1 and the plans and specifications adopted by resolution adopting specifications No. 135, all of which are now on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Torrance.

Attention is hereby directed to the "National Pavements Corporations License Mixture Agreement," dated June 19, 1923, on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Torrance, California.

That said contemplated work and improvement, in the opinion of the said Board of Trustees, is of more than local or ordinary public benefit, and said Board hereby makes the expense of said work and improvement chargeable upon a district of lands, which said district said Board hereby declares to be the district benefited by said work and improvement, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof; which said district is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point 50 feet easterly from the westerly line of Cabrillo Avenue and distant two hundred and eighty-five and forty-two hundredths (285.42) feet north of the northern boundary line of

222nd Street in the City of Torrance, and running thence southerly and parallel with the westerly line of Cabrillo Avenue to the center line of Plaza Del Amo; thence westerly along the center line of Plaza Del Amo to the eastern boundary line of Arlington Avenue; thence northerly along the said easterly line of Arlington Avenue to a point two hundred and eighty-five and forty-two hundredths (285.42) feet north of the northern boundary line of 222nd Street; thence easterly in a straight line to the point of beginning; saving and excepting from the above bounded and described area the area of all public streets, avenues, and alleys contained therein.

Notice is Hereby Given that serial bonds to represent unpaid assessments, and to bear interest at the rate of seven per cent (7%) per annum, will be issued hereunder in the manner provided by the improvement bond act of 1915, the last installment of which bonds shall mature nine years from the second day of July next succeeding nine months from their date.

Notice is Hereby Given that on Tuesday, the 4th day of September, 1923, at 8 o'clock p.m., in the Council Chamber of the City Hall of said City of Torrance, any and all persons having any objection to the said work and improvement may appear before said Board and show cause why said proposed improvement should not be carried out in accordance with this resolution.

The Clerk shall cause this Resolution of Intention to be published twice in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper published in said City of Torrance, and hereby designated for that purpose by the Board of Trustees.

The Superintendent of Streets shall cause to be conspicuously posted along the line of said contemplated work and improvement and in front of all property liable to be assessed, notices of the passage of this Resolution of Intention, in the time, form and manner required by law.

Except as hereinbefore noted, all of the herein proposed work shall be done pursuant to an act of the legislature of the State of California designated the "Improvement Act of 1911," approved Apr. 7, 1911, and amendments thereto.

I hereby certify that the foregoing resolution was duly and regularly introduced and adopted by the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, the 7th day of August, 1923, by the following vote:
