President Harding Memorial Service

An impressive memorial service to our late president was held at the Lomita Community church last Sunday morning. A large picture of the president was displayed, draped with the national flag and black ribbon. Jardiniers of beautiful flowers adorned the pulpit platform. Besides appropriate hymns, two solos were sung: Mrs. Bromley was heard in "Lead, Kindly Light," and Mrs. Willacy sang "Oh, Rest in the

Lord." These special numbers added much to the service.

The text chosen by the pastor was "Know ye not that there is a prince and great man fallen in Israel?" Mr. Harding was great in his simplicity, his kindness and common sense. He was a typical American, winning his way from the newspaper office to the president's chair.

Like Lincoln, Garfield and McKinley, he was taken away when he was most needed to carry out the great political measures he had planned. His speeches, made on his western tour to Alaska and to California, have added weight now that his voice is still. His last speech was read by his private secretary, Mr. Christian, when a beautiful banner from the Knights Templar of Ohio was presented to the Knights Templar of California. Mr. Harding's Christian faith and devotion to the cause of Christianity are revealed in that last message. As it was being read by Mr. Christian at the Hollywood bowl, the spirit of the author was winging his flight from earth. What better swan song could he have wished?
