ADVENTIST CHURCH DEDICATED

The Seventh Day Adventist church at 2600 Weston street, Lomita, will be dedicated Sabbath (Saturday), July 28, at 3 p.m. Elder Milton Adams, president of the Southern California conference, will preach the dedicatory sermon.

The Seventh Day people do not believe in erecting large, expensive churches, but do believe in giving heavily to missions. They have 36 churches in and around Los Angeles, with a membership upward of 4,000, and their gifts to foreign missions last year amounted to over \$120,000.

They also have a large hospital and clinic in the city of Los Angeles, which cared for approximately sixty thousands of suffering humanity last year.

They believe strongly in Christian education, and have many schools, academies and colleges, where they train missionaries for home and foreign fields.

Their creed is the Bible, and the following are some of the cardinal points of their faith: They observe the fourth commandment, and keep the seventh day Sabbath (Saturday). They believe in the second personal coming of Christ, and in the blessed nearness of that event. They believe in the unconscious state of the dead, and immortality only through Christ. They believe only those who have experienced the new birth are under grace, and that grace licenses no one to sin or transgress even one of the least of God's commandments. They do not keep the commandments to be saved, but because they are saved. They believe in the complete annihilation of the wicked, and that the righteous will be upon this earth after it is again made new. To them Christ is the all and in all, and must be Lord of all or He is no Lord at all.
