Col. Morgan Speaks

"Every bootlegger" as well as every man who carries liquor on his "hip" is as much a traitor to his country as the draft-dodger or the slacker during the late war" said Col. Dan Morgan Smith, Commander of the noted Battalion of Death during the World War, in a lecture last night at the American Legion hall in defense of the Wright law.

The proposed Wright law, according to its able advocate, would make every peace officer in every state eligible to arrest and prosecute violators of the Eighteenth amendment. At present, the speaker said, there were only twenty-eight officers and four judges in California, who had authority to either arrest or try these offenders.

More than one hundred interested listeners attended the lecture and were not only greatly entertained by the colonel's description of the part the Battalion of Death took in the war, but were enlightened as to the object of the Wright law as a deterrent of the present bootlegging epidemic.
