Restrictions On "Holly" Picking

The attention of deputy wardens has been called by the Los Angeles department of forestry to Section 334A of the Penal Code, which regulates the gathering and selling of the Christmas berry, or Toyon, commonly called holly. This law makes the picking of holly on private or public lands, or the sale thereof, a misdemeanor. It will not be the policy of the department to make arrests for picking a few sprigs of holly in a reasonable manner, but the mutilating or destroying of holly bushes will be penalized. The picking by individuals of small quantities for a wreath, or for home decoration will be allowed in lengths of not more than a foot. In order to pick for sale any holly from privately owned lands, one must have in writing the consent of the owner of the land.

Game Wardens Watching Abalones

In a recent raid at Portuguese Bend by Assistant Foresters Turner, Graves, and Johnson, and District Warden George Taylor, Dr. A. L. Wilkes, R. H. Cromwell, J. R. Dinings, H. C. Hough of Los Angeles; J. E. Throne, La Verne; and O. N. Murray of Pomona were arrested, charged with having over their limit of ten abalones, to which charge each pleaded guilty and were each fined \$25. Charged with having abalones under five inches in their possession, C. Beauchamp, H. C. Brown and E. Liebert of Los Angeles, and W. J. Davis of Redondo, pleaded guilty, and it cost them \$25 each.

ORDINANCE NO. 40.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE REGULATING THE OPERATION OF POOL AND BILLIARD HALLS IN THE CITY OF TORRANCE.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

Section 1.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to conduct or keep open for business any pool hall or billiard hall in the City of Torrance between the hours of 12 o'clock, midnight, and 5:00 o'clock a. m.

Section 2.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to allow any minor to play pool or billiards, or any card game in any pool or billiard hall in the City of Torrance. A minor is hereby declared to be any female under the age of eighteen years, or any male under the age of twenty-one years.

Section 3.

A violation of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine of not exceeding \$100 or by 30 days in jail, or both.

Section 4.

The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper printed and published in the City of Torrance, which is hereby designated for that purpose.

And thereupon and thereafter this ordinance shall be in full force and effect.
