store. Tickets were sold at a feverish speed and soon the theater was filled, a large sign being hung out, "Sold Out." Over five hundred people were turned away.
The Merchants of Torrance used a full page advertisement in the Herald and Lomita News Letter last week, and gave the entertainment wide publicity, stating that \$200 in prizes would be given away in addition to a good show at the usual charge of admittance. Tuesday night's crowd proved beyond doubt that the method used for advertising the show was correct and every one who participated in the advertising is well pleased with the result. No question but that the valuable and numerous prizes had much to do with attracting such a record-breaking crowd, but the method used to inform the people of this city and vicinity of the special show and prizes proves beyond question that their judgment was right, and the Herald is thoroughly read and has the circulation.
Mr. and Mrs. McVey had selected a fine program for the screen, and by the continued applause the audience gave their approval.
A special entertainment had been arranged by the Business Men's committee. Harum E. Reeve of the Torrance Hardware Co., and president of the California State Hardware Dealers' Association, acted as spokesman. He led in community singing a parody especially written for the association.
