LLEWELLYN TO INCREASE ITS CAPITAL

Increase From Million and Half to Five Million Dollars

According to John Milner, secretary, the Llewellyn Iron Works has recently increased its capital stock from \$1,500,000 to \$5,000,000. A certificate of the increase is said to have been submitted to, and approved by the State Corporation Commission, the papers having been filed with the Los Angeles branch of that governmental department. The Llewellyn Iron Works, one of the largest concerns of its kind on the Pacific Coast, is headed by Reese Llewellyn, and the directors of the company are Walter Taylor, William Llewellyn, Milton Baruch, D. E. Llewellyn, John Milner, Benjamin Harwood, J. M. Hale, Winifred L. Milner, and Reese Llewellyn.

Organization of the company was perfected in Los Angeles in 1884, and business was started on a very small scale, gradually increasing its capacity and personnel until 1916, when more room was needed, and the directors decided to locate in Torrance. The first open hearth was opened in this city in October of that year, and the steel mills began operating in January and February of the following year. The present Llewellyn Iron Works is rated as one of the largest plants west of Chicago, and employs approximately 1500 men.

Have Your Lights Tested At Day and Night Garage

The Torrance Day and Night Garage on Cabrillo street has been appointed as the official adjusting station for automobile headlights. Under the law the rays of an auto headlight should strike the ground not more than 75 feet ahead of the car.

While the law is plain, it is many times disregarded, as all drivers know. So negligent have drivers become that night driving on well traveled highways is a task to be dreaded, as a majority of the night accidents are said to be due to the glare of the headlights on an approaching car, blinding the driver into the side of the road, and in many cases into a ditch. With more than 300 lighting devices on autos that have been approved by the motor vehicle department, it remains for the driver to see that in the first place his lights comply with the law, and secondly that they are properly adjusted. The Day and Night Garage has been supplied with the plans for the official manner in which the test is to be made, and will be prepared today to make the necessary tests for Torrance drivers.


