Vanderlip Plans to Sell 5000 Acres of Palos Verdes

Five thousand acres of the Palos Verdes estates will be sold outright by March for \$1,500,000 to the original subscribers, or interests represented by E. G. Lewis, according to a new plan announced by Frank A. Vanderlip, owner of the 16,000 acre ranch which Lewis proposes to transform into a city beautiful.

When the 5000 acres are taken over an option on 9000 acres will be extended until March 1, 1924, it is said.

"Should they exercise the option to purchase 5000 acres on or before March 1," said Mr. Vanderlip, "they own absolutely that amount of land and can proceed at once with the development operations as planned."

"Last Thousand" Return with Wives

America's last thousand came home from Europe yesterday, signaling the nation's closing action in its participation in the World War.

From the deck of the United States army transport St. Mihiel, the soldiers who kept watch on the Rhine gained their first glimpse of their homeland after an absence of five years. With them were French, Belgians and German wives and children, who saw for the first time the land they are to call home.

Savannah turned out to a man to welcome the troops and to greet the women and children from the country's former Allies and enemy nations. The reception began shortly after 11 o'clock yesterday morning when the cutter Yamacraw and the tug McCauley met the transport beyond Tybee bar. At quarantine a party of congressmen, Gov. Thomas W. Hardwick of Georgia, Mayor Paul E. Seabrook, and other state and local officials and army officers boarded the St. Mihiel from the cutter.
