"Daddy of Signal Hill" Gets Torrance Leases

John Sandburg, locally known among oil men as the "Father of Signal Hill," and who has recently formed the Coast Lines Consolidated Oils, Inc., is the latest addition to the ranks of oil operators to invest in leases in the Torrance field.

Sandburg was among the earliest enthusiasts envisioning a big oil future for Signal Hill. Sandburg Crew No. 1 well was started by him 200 feet south of the discovery well before oil was struck. Many hundreds of Long Beach and Los Angeles stockholders of the Sandburg Petroleum Company will share in the company's first dividend to be paid April 1.

R. R. Richey was elected vice-president, Julium Aichele, secretary and Victor C. Hanson, treasurer. The new company received its incorporation papers last week. It is incorporated for \$1,000,000, holds valuable leases on Signal Hill, Torrance and Huntington Beach, and plans an immediate drilling campaign. One thousand acres are under lease in Fresno county.

IN KNITTED SPORTSWEAR TWO TYPES ARE EXPLOITED

It is to be noted that it blouses at the waistline—a feature demanded by smart wearers. Its sleeves are plain and very long with snug-fitting buttoned cuffs, made of a furry wool banding which finishes the neck and the side fastening. It is a one-color affair that looks capable, comfortable and very smart.
