The proper time to ship is from now until the middle of April and for the convenience of those in Torrance who desire to send their eastern friends a perfect sample of local fruit Mr. Paige is authorized to accept orders.

A box of the very best oranges will cost the shipper approximately \$3.50 to which is to be added approximately \$1.50 for expressage. This will deliver the box anywhere in the vicinity of Chicago, Boston or New York and for a small sum the gift can be laid down at the friend's door in as perfect condition as it left the Redlands packing plant.

H. E. Paige, the well-known El Prado grocer, has made arrangements with managers of Redlands orange packing houses to pack, ship and deliver to any eastern address choicest oranges in amounts from one box up.

During the height of the orange season, according to Mr. Paige, the Redlands packing plants ship several carloads of oranges to eastern addresses. The temperature of these cars are kept uniform and assurance given the shipper that the fruit, which is selected at the plants with the greatest care, will reach their destination in excellent shape. As the carloads are made up of small shipments of from one to ten boxes and will be used in advertising California's citrus crop, only the finest fruit is selected.

1,000,000 VOLTS IN MAN'S BODY FAILS TO KILL

How a man could survive the passage of 1,000,000 volts of electricity through his body was the chief topic of conversation on the campus of the University of California, Southern Branch today following the demonstration of that very thing in a demonstration given by the Southern California Edison Company.

G. R. Pettit, engineer of the company, took the 1,000,000 volts and did it again five minutes later, just to show that it could be done. But he warned students not to try the same thing with smaller amounts, because the chance of survival is about one in 1,000,000.

The secret of the feat is that the electricity is of such high frequency that it does not injure the tissues of the body, the engineer explained.

This demonstration will be given in Torrance soon under auspices of the Chamber of Commerce. Watch for the date.
