

### Thrift Builds Character And Leads To Independence

Of great importance to parents is the organization of the Los Angeles Banks School Savings Association. This association is operated by the Los Angeles Clearing House in co-operation with the Board of Education. Its sole aim is to encourage thrift among the school children.

The cost of introducing a school savings system and maintaining it for the first year has been conservatively estimated at \$35,000. This amount has been furnished by the banks as a contribution in the interest of greater thrift among school children. This generous donation is the more remarkable in view of the fact that there is no case of record where banks have ever made a profit out of school savings.

Thrift leads to independence and builds character. Children who practice it soon acquire thrifty habits. Thrifty children make the best kind of citizens. A little encouragement on your part along with thrifty lines may mean more complete financial success for your children when they grow up.

You are invited to co-operate in this movement, by seeing that every member of your family attending elementary schools secures a savings safe and begins to save at once. Co-operating with you in this work is the Board of Education, the Superintendent of Schools, our school teachers and our banks. The Los Angeles School Savings plan makes saving easy.

The plan is a simple one, patterned after the home safe plan popular with so many people today. Approximately 50,000 persons in Los Angeles are using home safes as an aid to savings. Through these safes they have been able to accumulate several millions of dollars. Because this plan has proven to be a great success the school savings system as adopted is very similar in many respects. Small home safes will be loaned to school children free without a deposit or a guarantee. These safes will be locked when delivered, the keys remaining in the possession of the banks. This prevents savers from extracting money from the safes and spending it foolishly. After a child has deposited a coin in a safe, he cannot extract it, but must take the safe to a bank where it will be opened. By the time he has done this the desire to spend has most likely passed.

In order to secure a safe parents or guardian will sign a receipt for it, send to the teacher by the pupil and the teacher will then lend a handsome safe free, giving the child at the same time an envelope containing the names of the banks and branch banks where regular school savings accounts may be opened. On receiving one of these handsome safes the child takes it home and from time to time deposits his money in it—pennies, nickels, dimes and quarters, and when approximately \$1.00 has been saved, he takes the safe to a bank and opens a regular savings account.

This account is identical with all savings accounts carried by banks, and school savings depositors receive the same courteous attention and consideration which banks give to customers having much larger balances. Besides paying all the expenses of the school savings system, banks pay the same rate of interest on school savings deposits as paid on term savings accounts. This is a great inducement for children to open savings accounts as soon as they have saved their first dollar, and also to deposit their savings thereafter as fast as small sums have been accumulated in the safes.

Upon opening a bank account every school savings depositor will receive, complimentary, a school ruler and penholder, and the safe will be returned to them in order that they may continue to save as before.

Having opened a bank account, pupil will take his passbook to the principal of his school, who will present pupil with an honor button to be worn as evidence that the pupil has a bank account and is saving money.

If there is one suggestion more than another which we wish to make to you at this time, it is that you interest your children in saving their pennies, nickels, dimes and quarters which are now slipping away unnoticed. See that they get home safes at once; tell them about the school savings plan and point out to them that there are 47,859 school children in California who have saved \$1,206,633.25. What other school children in California can do, school children in the Los Angeles district can duplicate.

Occasionally drop in the safe a penny, nickel or a dime yourself. Make it a rule in your household that every penny received by any member of your family as change goes to school savings. Many people save this way some save every penny, some every nickel, others every dime. Try the plan yourself, and in doing so you will en-

courage your children to follow your good example.

The benefits derived from being thrifty are too many and too well known to make it necessary for us to elaborate upon them here. You know that if your children acquire thrifty habits early in life the chances that they will ever come to want are exceedingly small. That they will always command the respect of others is acknowledged by everyone.

The schools and banks have entered into this work at a sacrifice of time and money. Their motives are unselfish, it being their desire to participate in a movement having as its object a practice of thrift on the part of school children. In co-operating in this work you help your own family. After your children are well started with their savings kindly speak to your neighbors and friends about the school savings system and interest them in what it is doing for your own children.

Don't put this off another day, but see that your children get safes. Supplement this by getting your children started to save without delay.

Near East Relief "Bundle Day," which is a national event, will be observed this year in more than 100 Southern California communities. It is planned to gather 125 tons of clothing supplies in the Southland.
