TORRANCE SCHOOL NOTES

The industries of Torrance were well advertised Wednesday, April 25, when the Torrance high school pupils entertained the Associated Students' Presidents of the Bay League. During the morning the presidents, the upper classmen and Mr. Barnett visited the Llewellyn Iron Works.

The high school domestic science classes served a dainty luncheon at noon and afterward a business meeting was held.

During the afternoon the party visited the Torrance Window Glass Company and an oil well in Vista Highlands. The high schools of Wilmington, Venice, Santa Monica, Inglewood, San Pedro, Lomita, Gardena and Huntington Park were represented.

Thursday, the art classes, accompanied by Miss Chase, visited the art department of the Gardena high school.

A swimming club, consisting of nearly forty girls, has been organized. Once a week Mr. Combs, instructor at the Redondo plunge, takes charge of both a beginner's and advanced class. The instruction is proving to be beneficial and very delightful to each girl. At least twenty girls who could not swim a stroke can now swim across the plunge.

The baseball team practices daily on the new diamond. The first game of the season will be with San Pedro on the Torrance field. The team feels grateful to the city council for having such a fine diamond on which to work.

Miss Mabel Taylor, teacher of modern languages, is building a bungalow here.

Mr. Gadeky, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce has informed us that the building permits for the first four months of this year far exceed the total of last year. The attendance in both elementary and high school is increasing in almost the same proportion.
