

ORDINANCE No. 77

An Ordinance Amending Ordinance No. 15 and Repealing Ordinance No. 39.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

Section 1
Section 1 of Ordinance No. 15 of the City of Torrance is hereby amended to read as follows:

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance shall in each calendar month hold two regular meetings for the conduct of the business of said Board. Said meetings shall be held on the FIRST and THIRD MONDAYS of each and every calendar month, in the south room of that certain building located on Lot 3, Block 1 of Torrance Tract, in the City of Torrance, State of California, which room shall be known as the Council Chamber, and during the months of October to March both inclusive, said meetings shall be called at seven o'clock P. M. and during the months of April to September, both inclusive, said meetings shall be called at eight o'clock P. M. When any regular meeting falls on a holiday, said meeting shall be held on the next succeeding business day thereafter. All meetings shall hold until duly adjourned whether same shall continue after twelve o'clock midnight or not.

Section 2
Ordinance No. 39 is hereby repealed.

Section 3
The City Clerk shall certify to the passing of this ordinance and cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, and thereafter same shall be in full force and effect.

ORDINANCE No. 78

An Ordinance Amending Ordinance No. 20.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

Section 1
Ordinance No. 20 of the City of Torrance is hereby amended by adding thereto the following, to be known as Section 5 b:

Section 5 b. It shall be unlawful for any person to propel, or cause to be propelled any vehicle on Arlington Avenue in the City of Torrance across the intersection of 220th Street with said Arlington Avenue between 7:30 o'clock A. M. and 4:30 o'clock P. M. on days which the Torrance Public School is in session without first bringing said vehicle to a stop within ten (10) feet of said intersection. And it shall be unlawful to propel, or cause to be propelled, any vehicle along said Arlington Avenue across its intersection with Carson Street at any time without first bringing said vehicle to a stop within ten (10) feet of said intersection.
A safety zone, twenty (20) feet wide, is hereby created extending across Carson Street southerly from the southeast corner of Lot 4 of Block

30, Torrance Tract, and it shall be unlawful for any person to propel, or cause to be propelled, any vehicle across said "Safety Zone" between 7:30 o'clock A. M. and 4:30 o'clock P. M. on days during which the Torrance Public School is in session without first bringing such vehicle to a stop within ten (10) feet of such "Safety Zone."

The City Clerk shall certify to the passing of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, and thereafter same shall be in full force and effect.

ORDINANCE No. 79

An Ordinance Regulating the Transportation of High Explosives Within the City Limits of the City of Torrance.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

Section 1
It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to transport or cause to be transported over any street in the City of Torrance any nitroglycerine, dynamite, or other High Explosive, except along the following streets:

Carson Street from the East Boundary Line of the City of Torrance to Artisan Street,
Artisan Street from Carson Street to Plaza del Amo,
Plaza del Amo from Artisan Street to Arlington Avenue,
Arlington Avenue from Plaza del Amo to South City Limits,
El Camino Real from East City Limits to West City Limits.

Section 2
Any violation of this ordinance shall be punishable by fine of not to exceed Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) or by imprisonment not to exceed ninety (90) days or both.

Section 3
The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald and thereupon and thereafter this ordinance shall be in full force and effect.
