Rosecrans Well Will Produce, but Shutoff Is Faulty

COMPTON, Feb. 26.—After swabbing for 36 hours in the Rosecrans No. 1 hole, during which time officials of the Union Oil company have satisfied themselves that it will prove to be a commercial producer, it was announced late Saturday that the well is wet and will have to be recemented. Consequently it will be ten days or two weeks before anything definite comes from the Rosecrans and the result of the production test is made available. It was declared officially, however, that the company is now satisfied that the Compton field is sufficiently established to look forward to greater developments in the area in which the Rosecrans is located.

While the Rosecrans is being recemented the Union is going ahead with the cleaning out of the old Potter Oil company well, half a mile to the north. This work has been carried down to the 441-foot level.

Tests made of oil from the Rosecrans No. 1 show it to be high gravity. The best tests previously made in the Compton field, it is said, are from 29 to 31 degrees.

Rosecrans No. 1 is located near Harbor boulevard where the highway jogs near Compton.
