Santa Fe Gives Publicity Item To Activity Here

Torrance received wide publicity in the April issue of "Earth," a nationally distributed magazine published by the Santa Fe system. The following item appeared in this magazine: "The Santa Fe railroad is spending three-quarters of a million dollars outside the Torrance city limits. Six factory units are being built there for use of the Santa Fe oil department, and after drilling of wells has been finished on the Santa Fe's 4000 acres and the wells are on production, the factory units will be used as railroad shops. An industrial district and many new workmen's homes will naturally grow up about the Santa Fe site. The new Santa Fe line from El Segundo to Wilmington is already completed through Torrance."
