SANTA FE IN VAN WITH TWO PRETTY WELLS

Brings In Pair Of Producers Above 1000 Barrel Class

Chancellor-Canfield led the procession of operators with two fine producers over the week-end. Torrance No. 50 is making 1100 barrels, and No. 55, drilled under contract by the Federal Drilling company, is yielding 1200 barrels. No. 55 was completed at 3725 feet. Both wells are in the old Redondo road district, offsetting the Petroleum Securities Marble property. The Standard Oil company completed Interstate No. 5 and No. 6. Each well is flowing at a rate of 250 barrels a day.

The Sentinel Oil company brought in Joughlin No. 5 for 650-barrel production. It was completed at 3827 feet.

A big argument being used by opponents of acceptance of Henry Ford's bid for Muscle Shoals is the offer made by Elon H. Hooker, owner of an electro-chemical company at Niagara Falls; J. G. White, a big chemical manufacturer, and W. W. Atterbury, operative head of the Pennsylvania railroad system, to function as an operating company for the government in the operation of the Muscle Shoals project. They estimate the government's returns in 50 years at \$305,000,000, whereas Ford offers only \$91,000,000.
