CIVIL SERVICE FAKE ADS ARE BARED BY U. S.

Vigilance Committee Warns the Public Against Fraud

WASHINGTON, June 17.—The United States civil service commission and the national vigilance committee of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World today issued a joint warning against misleading advertising of many so-called civil service coaching schools.

The following points were emphasized: 1. No "school" of this kind has any connection whatever with the civil service commission or with any other branch of the government.

2. No school can give advance information regarding examination questions.

3. No school can furnish civil service information of value which can not be obtained without cost from the civil service commission at Washington or its representative at the post-office or customhouse in any of approximately 3500 cities.

4. No school can "guarantee" appointment in the classified civil service. Appointment can be secured only through open competitive examination under the civil service rules.

No school can cause a competitor to be certified for appointment out of the regular order, as determined by his examination rating.

The civil service commission states that large numbers of applicants for examination received at its office indicate that many civil service schools accept as clients and take money from practically illiterate persons who could not possibly pass any kind of examination.

E. I. McKinley, deputy labor commissioner of Arkansas, it is said in the joint warning, recently has investigated correspondence schools of this class, and authorizes the statement that he has concluded that the majority of them come as near being "fakes" as the postal laws permit.

The "schools" that Mr. McKinley condemns are the ones that offer to qualify persons for civil service positions or make a professional man of a laborer in a few weeks. Mr. McKinley says that schools which prepare for civil service examinations rank second to "detective schools" in number.

Although a water test proved that the cement job at Francis No. 1, C. C. M. O.'s Western avenue wildcat was unsuccessful, the company is drilling ahead at 3750 feet. The fact that the well is a test enables the company to proceed without approval of the mining bureau.

The Standard Oil company completed the only two producers brought in over the week end. Both were second tier wells on the Marble lease. Marble Lease No. 8, completed at 3840 feet is pumping 250 barrels a day. No. 11, drilled to 3825 feet, is making 150 barrels on the beam.

The Fullerton Oil company is carrying development west of its Cotton Fee property. Two locations have been made on the company's Barlow lease which is a short distance east of Standard's Ellinwood ranch.

The Petroleum Midway Oil company is drilling one well on the Gilman lease in the southwestern extension of the field. This lease borders on Fullerton's Cotton Fee property.

The Standard Oil company will bring in three more wells on the Marble lease this week. Nos. 9, 10 and 12 are ready for completion; All were drilled below 3800 feet.

ORDINANCE NO. 89

An Ordinance of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance Repealing Ordinances Nos. 24 and 77 and Amending Ordinance No. 15 by Providing for the Change of the Place of Meeting of Such Board.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows: Section 1 Ordinances Nos. 24 and 77 are hereby repealed.

Section 2

Section No. 1 of Ordinance No. 15 is hereby amended to read as follows: The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance shall in each calendar month hold two regular meetings for the conduct of the business of said Board. Said meetings shall be held on the First and Third Mondays of each and every calendar month, in the room known as No. 1215, El Prado Street, Torrance, being the most Northern ground floor room of the El Prado Building, which room shall be known as the Council Chamber, and during the months of October to March, both inclusive, said meetings shall be called at seven o'clock P. M., and during the months of April to September, both inclusive, said meetings shall be called at eight o'clock P. M. When any regular meeting falls on a holiday, said regular meeting shall be held on the next succeeding business day thereafter. All Trustees' meetings shall hold until duly adjourned whether the same shall continue after twelve o'clock midnight or not.

Section 3

The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this Ordinance by a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Board of Trustees and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a semi-weekly newspaper printed and published in the City of Torrance, and which is hereby designated for that purpose, and thereupon and thereafter this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect.
