THWARTED IN EFFORT TO COMPLY WITH THE DYING WISH OF HIS WIFE

NEW YORK - Tolling over the trail to Chicago, on foot, with a child in his arms, is Crist Hanson, thwarted in an attempt to comply with his wife's dying wish, in Colorado. As she lay on her deathbed she made Crist promise that he would take their infant son back to their old home in Sweden. After Hanson buried his wife there was little money left. So, pulling a knapsack over one shoulder and taking his little son in his arms, he set out for New York on foot.

Arriving here after many weary days on the trail, he sought to arrange to work his way to Sweden. Perhaps he could have shipped as a sailor if it hadn't been for the boy. But there was no job for him. Thus balked, Crist decided to go back to his former home in Chicago, and he is on his way.

A letter from Hurum Reeve, recommending the paving of alleys in the business district and reporting that he found considerable opposition to a similar improvement in the residence district, was read.

Permission was granted W. H. Gilbert to construct several two-room and three-room frame dwellings on his auto camp site on Western avenue.

The pay of Ollie Stevenson of the police department was raised to \$150 a month and \$30 a month provided for a man to relieve him on occasions. At present Officer Stevenson is on duty 24 hours a day, being subject to all fire calls and to calls at night.

In accordance with a policy recently adopted, Officers Young and McMillan were voted increases in pay of \$15 a month each.

The board instructed City Engineer Jessup to prepare plans and specifications for the paving of Cabrillo avenue over the Santa Fe tracks. When the railroad company constructed its line it did not provide a grade at the crossing but left the street closed with the tracks three or four feet above the street level. The city has a deed to the street over the tracks. It was pointed out that Cabrillo avenue should be opened, and the board believed the best way to accomplish this end was to institute paving proceedings over the tracks.
