All assessments that are not paid in cash on or before September 30th, 1924, automatically, by operation of law, remain a first lien against the property for a period of ten (10) years, and are represented by bonds as provided by law.
The lien cannot be removed during the ten (10) year life of the bonds, after the bonds are issued, except by the payment of the amount of the assessment, plus interest at 7% for the full ten (10) years or the unexpired portion thereof.
The assessment, if not paid before the bonds are issued, remains a first lien against the property ahead of existing mortgages and all other liens except general taxes, and in the case of a sale of the property or future mortgaging of the property, often makes it necessary for the property owner to remove the lien with added penalty of interest at the end of the ten (10) year period in order to give a clear title to the property.
ASSESSMENTS THAT GO TO BOND are payable in ten annual installments with interest at 7% per annum.
On account of a large portion of the assessments being of a small amount, we earnestly advise that payments be made in cash to avoid the annoyance and trouble which will result if the property is bonded by reason of the assessment going delinquent.
