Notes Gleaned While the Oil Editor Bumps Around Proven Territory

A record for California oil fields, perhaps a record for all oil fields, has been established here by the Pan American and Petroleum Securities Companies and the Perkins Oil Well Cementing Corporation. Starting last August the Perkins has performed 53 cement jobs for the P. A. and P. S. outfits in this field, and not one of them tested wet. The fifty-fourth job, on a Kleinmeyer well, was the first to be unsuccessful.

The Shell company is still fishing at Kettler No. 2.

There is nothing new on the Lora J. today. The company will re-entrench the hole this week.

Three hundred barrels of new production were obtained by operators in the oil field over the

weekend. The Chanslor-Canfield Midway Oil Company completed Del Amo No. 100 on Redondo boulevard west of Torrance at 3560 feet for a pumped yield of 100 barrels a day. The Petroleum Securities Company brought in Kleinmeyer A-17 in the eastern part of the field for a production of 200 barrels a day. The Kleinmeyer well sanded up shortly after being swabbed in, but will be back on production again shortly.

Bottom water showed in a test taken by the Standard Oil Company at Weston No. 1 in West Lomita and a new cement plug has been put in the hole.

Coolidge and Capt. Fredericks Favor Boulder Dam Work

President Coolidge's public declaration in favor of the early development of the great water power project of the west is concurred in by Congressman John D. Fredericks, who last week pledged himself to work for the development of the Boulder Canyon Dam project, as a water control, reclamation, irrigation and power measure. In explaining his advocacy of maximum and early development of the Colorado river, Congressman Fredericks read an excerpt from his inaugural address, given February 22, 1923, in which he said as follows:

"The present situation in industry is but a small beginning compared to the vision the future holds, when the almost unlimited power of the Colorado river is developed and brought here for our use. Notwithstanding adherence to the principle of keeping business and government separate, this has appeared to me to be an undertaking by the general government."

"This," Capt. Fredericks told his hearers, "was my stand then and is my stand now on the Boulder Canyon Dam project."



