## Russian Baroness Tells of Conditions In Her Native Land

An attentive audience listened with unusual interest to the address of Baroness Atiley de Roppe at the high school auditorium Tuesday night, when the former Russian noblewoman brought to Torrance an illuminating picture of conditions in her native land. She outlined the tragedy of the defeat of the Russian army, pointing out that the higher officers had sold themselves to Germany. The baroness praised the relief work of American agencies in Russia during the famines which have swept the country under the regime of the Bolsheviks.
