ORDINANCE No. 96

An Ordinance Relating to Drunkenness and Disorderly Conduct.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

Section 1

It shall be unlawful for any person to be on any public street, alley, place, park, or other public place, or at any assembly hall, or other place of assembly, in the City of Torrance, in an intoxicated or drunken condition.

Section 2

A person shall be deemed to be in an intoxicated or drunken condition, within the meaning of this ordinance, if he shall be in such a state of intoxication as that he shall have lost normal control of any functions of his body, or be in such a state of intoxication as that he is disturbing the peace or quiet of the neighborhood in which he is, by loud or hysterical or tumultuous conduct, or by quarreling or threatening to quarrel, or by fighting.

Section 3

It shall be unlawful for any male and female person who shall not be married to each other to cohabit together in the City of Torrance, or to occupy alone the same bedroom or apartment in any rooming house, apartment house or hotel, or to occupy alone the same residence in said city. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prohibit the immediate members of a family, who are blood relations within not more than three degrees of consanguinity removed, from occupying the same residence or apartment.

Section 4

Any violation of this ordinance shall be punishable by fine of not to exceed Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) or by imprisonment not to exceed ninety (90) days or both.

Section 5

The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, and thereupon and thereafter this ordinance shall be in full force and effect.

Off-the-Face Styles in Hats Vary the Mode

Oil Field Payroll Will Be Here For Long Time To Come

With every large oil company dipping into its surplus oil stocks in order to meet the demand for petroleum products, and with a consequent increase in the price of oil confidently expected by operators, the 100-barrel wells, now the rule in the local oil field, are commanding an unusual amount of respect.

As a result of this increasingly wholesome regard for wells that would have brought disdain a year ago, programs of the more substantial companies operating in the field here call for the development of leases in proved territory large enough to accommodate 270 widely spaced rigs.

In considering the future of the field here and the possibilities for continuance of the oil field payroll, observers invariably point to the return of the 100-barrel well to its position of respect among producers.

All of the drilling now underway and contemplated is in territory where little better than 100-barrel production may be expected. The average production in the whole field today is only slightly more than 100 barrels to the well. Yet the Standard, Superior, General Petroleum, Chanlor-Canfield Midway, Petroleum Midway, and Shell companies are all active here and will be for months to come.

Poggi Development

The G. P. has gone in on the Poggi property south of the Joughin ranch and just north of Weston street west of Harbor City, with a program that calls for at least 20 offset wells.

On the southern part of the Joughin leases Standard and Superior are running an aggregate of about 10 strings of tools.

West of the Poggi lease the Marine Oil Company is erecting a rig. On the Kleinmeyer B lease, offsetting the Poggi property, the Petroleum Securities is building two new derricks.

On the Kleinmeyer A and B leases the Petroleum Securities Company has seven wells on production, each making about 100 barrels a day, yet the company is drilling ten more holes on these two pieces of land.

In the western part of the field the Standard Oil Company is drilling up the Marble property as rapidly as possible and is also drilling on the Quandt and Courier-Flint leases, near where the Fullerton Oil Company is busy with three bores on the Colton lease. On all of these leases 100-barrel production is all that can be anticipated.

The Chanlor-Canfield Midway Oil Company has almost completed its development of the Torrance lease and is now running only two

strings of tools on the property, while six wells are being drilled on the Del Amo lease. On the Del Amo there is space for 150 more wells, widely spaced, and they will be drilled gradually.

In Redondo Area

In the Redondo district every week sees a new rig go up, despite what previously was regarded as too small production to be taken seriously. In this area the Shell, Petroleum Midway, Chanlor-Canfield and General Petroleum companies are active, although none is drilling more rapidly than the leases require. On the Frenzer lease the Shell company spudded in Frenzer No. 2 on Oct. 29 and is landing water string slightly below 3200 feet.

Considerable interest has been aroused among operators in the success of the Pan American and Petroleum Midway companies in bringing "dead" oil wells back to life in the closely-drilled Lomita field.

Brought to Life

The P. A. recently took over six wells which were sanded up and idle. Every one of these holes is now pumping about 30 barrels a day. Yet the two big companies have found this reiving process profitable. Whereas small operators with only a well or two could not profitably keep the wells on production, bigger companies, owning several wells, can do so. As a result of the success of these two companies with about 20 Lomita wells, considerable redevelopment may be expected in Lomita, as soon as the deep sand quests are over and the price of oil advances. If a deep sand is discovered, of course, there will be plenty of deepening activity all over the field.

In any event, programs of companies with leases that are still undeveloped, and prospective redevelopment of idle wells, insure the fact that drilling will be going on here for at least two more years, without much rush, to be sure, but steadily.
