Abbott and Frymier Assert Cash Passed

despite the objections of the defense, who argued that he could not be recalled because he had been present in the courtroom while other witnesses were on the stand.

In answer to a question by Costello, Draffen identified Dr. Shidler's affidavit and declared that after the trial and his release Anderson took the affidavit from a desk drawer, showed it to Draffen, and said: "Take a slant at this. It's been in this drawer all the time and if you hadn't come through I could have stuck you with it."

At A. Higgins, one of the five Compton men, took the stand Tuesday morning. His memory concerning events that took place on July 26, the day of his arrest, was vague. He admitted that he was intoxicated that day, and was dismissed as a witness.

F. Mangold, another of the five Compton men, was then called. He stated emphatically several times that he did not engage Morewood as an attorney and asserted that he never saw the Hermosa Beach lawyer until the trial in Torrance.

The prosecution is stressing this point in anticipation of Morewood's defense, which, it is said, will be built up on the contention that the money Morewood received

from B. F. Frymier constituted Morewood's fee as an attorney.

Says Abbott Ran Mangold related the details of the Carson street scene when Draffen "punched Abbott in the nose." He asserted that after Draffen hit Abbott the motorcycle officer took to his heels. Mangold declared that he followed the officer and Draffen and separated them. At the police station, according to Mangold's testimony, Anderson asked Abbott "is this the man who helped you out?" and Abbott answered in the affirmative. Mangold testified that Anderson then suggested that Mangold be "turned loose," but that Abbott replied "No, put him in, too."

Dr. George F. Shidler, Torrance physician and surgeon, took the stand and identified the affidavit which he made out on the day of the arrest of the five men. The affidavit asserted that the men were in an intoxicated condition and unfit to drive a car. This affidavit was not introduced at the hearing of the case at which the men were released.

In answer to questions, Dr. Shidler testified: "The life of anyone on the road was jeopardized while men in their condition were driving."
