## WIFE SAVERS

**Wheat Cereal.**—Take nice clean wheat, run through a hand mill (coffee mill will do) and steam in a double boiler four hours. One-half cup ground wheat added to two cups hot water, salt to taste, is sufficient for our family. This is a good body builder for growing children and outdoor workers.

**String Bean Salad.**—Take two quarts string beans, cut the ends off, then cut beans lengthwise in fine slices (each bean in three or four slices). Cook in salted water until tender. Now take one tablespoon bacon fryings, one tablespoon flour, and add this brown flour to the salted water on the beans. It makes a nice rich gravy. Add one-half cup vinegar, one-half cup sugar, salt and pepper to taste. Take one cucumber that has been pared and sliced fine, let stand in salt water a few minutes and add to the beans after the vinegar, etc., have been added. Bring to a scald and serve hot.

**Egg Omelet.**—Take one-half slice of bread for each person, add sufficient milk to soak it up well. You may take a fork and mash it if you wish, then add one egg for each person and beat up well with the fork. Pour it out in a hot skillet, greased well with butter; salt and cover. When nice and brown, turn and fry on the other side.

Here is a recipe for a wholesome Christmas sweet for children. Every normal human being has a sweet tooth, and the mother's aim should be to satisfy this natural craving without disastrous results to the digestive organs. **Apricot candy:** Three-fourths cup dried apricots, three-fourths cup shredded coconut, one-half cup chopped nut meats, one tablespoon lemon juice, one-half teaspoon grated orange rind, one-half teaspoon grated lemon rind. Wash the apricots and steam them for five minutes. Put the first three ingredients through a meat chopper. Add lemon juice and lemon and orange rind. Knead until well blended. If mixture seems too dry add a little orange juice. Roll out in a sheet one-quarter inch thick. Cut into small squares or diamonds or into other small and fancy shapes.

To keep the baby's fingers snug and warm in winter, put a small amount of cotton batting in the top of each little mitten.

When leaving a note for the milk man, if you will invert a jelly glass over the mouth of the bottle the note will not blow away.

**Mock Chicken Salad.**—Boil two small tenderloins; when they are perfectly cold chop fine, add one cup of chopped celery and nearly one cup of English walnut meats; pour over this mixture a mayonnaise dressing made as follows: Yolks of two eggs, one-half teaspoon salt, one teaspoon dry mustard, four tablespoons vinegar, a little pepper or paprika, one tablespoon of melted butter, two teaspoons sugar. Place all in a vessel and cook in boiling water, stirring constantly, with cream or milk as necessary. Serve with lettuce.

Care must be given salad greens as soon as they are delivered. Separate the lettuce, wash and shake to dry, then place the quantity in a fresh tea towel or salad bag, shake any remaining moisture out, and put in a cool place until needed. Never leave fresh salad greens in water. Wilted lettuce is sometimes partially revived by immersion in cold water for twenty minutes or so, but it revives much better if cleaned and placed in the salad bag on ice.

Cress is an addition to any salad. A sprig of water cress added to a cottage cheese or bean salad adds just the touch that lifts them out of the seemingly overfatty class. Cress will keep indefinitely if given the same treatment we give parsley for long keeping.

Wash the greens thoroughly, shake as dry as possible and put in a mason jar. Screw the top down just one thread on hold. Moisture will gather on the side of the jar and so long as it does the greens will keep fresh. Add a few drops of cold water as the moisture dries out.

Canned spinach, beans, cabbage or any canned vegetables to be served as salad should be opened, turned into a dish and chilled for an hour or so before serving. Any cleansing necessary, as removing the veins from shrimps, and any washing of dry pack products, should be done when the can is first opened.

Abbott was cross-examined Friday by Montedeleon and Fletcher, attorneys for the defendants. They made a long and strenuous effort to break down the story told by the former motorcycle officer. Time after time they were interrupted by Judge Collier, who asked what points they were trying to bring out.

On one of these occasions Attorney Fletcher said he did not wish to tell in front of the witness. Abbott was excused from the room and Fletcher said he was trying to make the witness make conflicting statements. The judge then instructed the attorney to proceed to a new line of questioning.

In the course of the cross-examination Abbott testified that on the night after the hearing in Torrance, while he was sitting in Morewood's car on Cabrillo street, Anderson drove up in his own machine and said: "Get out of that car. Everyone in town will know about this."

Attorney Fletcher's questioning of Abbott started way back in the former officer's career, when the attorney asked him when and where he was born. He was directing similar questions at the witness when the judge interrupted and ordered him to confine his questions to points at issue.
