Lomita Theatre Books Abraham Lincoln Classic

Film Will Be Shown Thursday Friday and Saturday

What is conceded to be one of the most interesting and valuable motion pictures ever made, "Abraham Lincoln," has been booked by the Lomita theatre for showing Thursday, Friday and Saturday. This assures the presentation of this most valuable historical and dramatic film in this city at the same time as in at least 5000 other of the most important theatres of the United States and Canada.
