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NOTICE OF PUBLIC WORKS

Public notice is hereby given that the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, did, at a regular meeting of said Board of Trustees, held on the 5th day of January, 1925, pass a Resolution of Intention No. 218 to order the following work to be done and improvement to be made, within said City, to-wit:

1. The abandoning, vacating and closing up of a portion of the alley in Block 27, Torrance Tract, as per map thereof recorded in Map Book 22, pages 94 and 95, Records of Los Angeles County, and particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the northeasterly corner of Lot 13, said Block 27, thence along the southeasterly ends of Lots 13 and 12, south 47° 25' 50" west 203.15 feet to a point, said point being north 47° 25' 50" east 21.02 feet from the southerly line of Lot 12; thence on a curve concave southwesterly, having a radius of 35 feet easterly and southeasterly a distance of 21.28 feet measured on the arc of said curve, to a point in the northwesterly end of Lot 6, said Block 27; thence north 47° 25' 50" east along the northwesterly line of said Lot 6, and the prolongation northeasterly thereof, 212.77 feet, more or less, to the northeasterly corner of Lot 2, said Block 27; thence on a direct line north 52° 06' 28" west 20.28 feet to point of beginning.

2. The exterior boundary of the district of lands to be affected and benefited by said work or improvement and to be assessed to pay the damages, costs and expenses thereof, are hereby specified and declared to be as follows: all property within said Block 27, Torrance Tract.

3. The proceedings for the above mentioned improvement shall be taken under an act approved March 6th, 1889, being entitled "An Act to provide for laying out, opening, extending, widening, straightening, or closing up in whole or in part any street, square, lane, alley, court or place within municipalities, and to condemn and acquire any and all land and property necessary and convenient for that purpose," and under all acts supplementary thereto and amendatory thereof.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC WORKS

Public Notice is hereby given that the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, did, at a regular meeting of said Board of Trustees, held on the 17th day of November, 1924, pass a Resolution of Intention No. 219, to order the following work to be done and improvement to be made, within said City, to-wit:

Section 1. The abandonment and closing up of the northerly eight feet of Redondo Boulevard as shown upon map of Tract No. 4070 filed in the office of the County Recorder, Map Book No. 46, Page 76.

Section 2. That the exterior boundary of the district of lands in the City of Torrance, Los Angeles County, California, to be benefited by said work or improvement and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, are hereby specified and declared to be as follows:

Beginning at a point on the easterly line of said Tract No. 4070, distant 120 feet southerly from the southerly line of Redondo Boulevard and running thence northerly along the easterly line of said Tract and the northerly extension thereof 348 feet, thence at right angles westerly 2880 feet, thence at right angles southerly 348 feet, thence easterly in a straight line to the point of beginning; excepting from the above area the area of any public street or boulevard contained therein.

Section 3. The proceedings for the above mentioned improvement shall be taken under an act approved March 6th, 1889, being entitled "An Act to provide for laying out, opening, extending, widening, straightening, or closing up in whole or in part any street, square, lane, alley, court or place within municipalities, and to condemn and acquire any and all land and property necessary and convenient for that purpose," and under all acts supplementary thereto and amendatory thereof.

WIFE SAVERS

Old, dry, hard cheese can be made as good as new, for cooking purposes, if put through the meat-grinder. Put it through the coarse part first and then the fine. Very hard pieces can thus be ground and put to good use.

When fresh cheese is to be grated in large amounts—for rabbit, for instance—try this method and save a lot of time and energy.

Chocolate Cream Pie.—One-half cup grated chocolate, one cup sugar, two tablespoons cornstarch, two cups milk, one teaspoon vanilla, one-eighth teaspoon salt. Melt chocolate over hot water. Mix sugar, cornstarch and water. Add milk slowly to melted chocolate, stirring until smooth. Add yolks of eggs well beaten and cook a minute longer. Cool and add vanilla. Pour into a baked pie shell and cover with a meringue made with the whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry with one-quarter cup of sugar. Bake in a slow oven until a light brown.

A wholesome and timely marmalade is made of dates and cranberries. Simmer together for twenty minutes one quart cranberries, one pound of stoned dates, and two cups water. Press through a sieve. Add two cups brown sugar and cook about fifteen minutes longer.

Bran Muffins.—One large cup of bran, one and one-half cups of flour, one teaspoon of salt, large one-third cup of molasses, one teaspoon of soda in one cup of milk or sour milk. Mix well, then mix in one tablespoon of sugar. Bake in greased pans twenty-five minutes in hot oven. This will make eight good-size muffins.

Cold Slaw.—Chop a white cabbage in the food chopper, using the medium cutter. Season with salt, pepper and sugar and moisten with vinegar. French dressing added to the chopped cabbage makes a nice relish with meats.

Not a season passes without new varieties of brushes being put on the market. Among convenient whisks are the tall ones with short handles. These

are fine for brushing draperies, freshly laundered blankets or sweaters to bring up the wool and make them like new.

Short and wide brooms, thin and pointed ones for upholstery, and the new fibre brushes twisted and shaped under water on the Florida coast, with varnished handles, are to be had, and they are the very best thing to take wrinkles out of clothes that have been packed away all summer.

And the long-handled whisk brooms for the fireplace and the crescent-shaped whisk brooms for stair use are not to be overlooked.

Stewed Figs.—Buy dried figs, wash, soak in a little cold water, then cook slowly until tender. Add a little sugar. Eat when cold.

Cornmeal Pancakes.—Scald one cup of cornmeal with one cup of boiling water, let cool. Add two well beaten eggs, one cup of milk, one cup of flour, two teaspoons baking powder, one teaspoon each of salt and sugar. Beat well and bake on a hot griddle. Serve with syrup.

Peanut Butter.—Thinning peanut butter with mayonnaise makes it last longer, gives it a better taste, and it is much easier to spread.

Chocolate Rice Pudding.—One-third cup rice, washed and boiled in one quart of sweet milk in a double boiler till soft. Take off fire, add two beaten eggs, one cup sugar, one-half cup cocoa and pinch of salt. Pour in a buttered earthen dish and bake one-half hour. Serve with sugar and cream.

Mrs. Christie of Redondo was a visitor at Mrs. Janet Woodburn's Friday.



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
