Harry Johnson of 254th street has accepted a position with the firm of Lockhart & Howard of San Pedro.


Revival meetings will be held at 2227 253d street, beginning Sunday afternoon, Jan. 25, and continuing each evening. Everyone invited.

H. C. Citizens Will Aid in Fight for Harbor Area Rights

At the Harbor City Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday night, several resolutions were adopted. One expressed confidence in the administration of C. J. Colden, president of the Los Angeles harbor commission, who has been the object of numerous attacks. Another resolution asked the state agricultural commission to appoint an expert for extermination of the Florida white fly, which has secured a hold in the citrus orchards of various sections. The resolution urges the state to appropriate funds to fight the pests.

and one for the Senate. President Coolidge recently took the treatment. Throughout the east great manufacturing concerns have installed chambers in their plants and announce eminently satisfactory results.

The treatment is not offensive, it is stated, the only discomfort of the patient being a slight smarting of the eyes. A chamber is installed at the cost of only about \$200.

The sweeping importance of the chlorine treatment will be appreciated by anyone who realizes the tremendous discomfort caused on this continent by colds, not to mention the vast economic loss each year.


The treatment is not used in deep-seated ailments such as pneumonia and influenza. It is pointed out that if sufficient gas were administered to kill germs deep in the lungs, the patient himself would die.

While the treatment is still in its experimental stages, the army medical department is positive in its statement that it cures 90 percent of the cases treated.
