ORDINANCE No. 111

An Ordinance Establishing a Planning Commission for the City of Torrance.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. There is hereby created a City Planning Commission of the City of Torrance, which shall be established, maintained and governed, and have the power as provided in that certain act of the Legislature of the State of California entitled "An Act to Provide for the Establishment, Government and Maintenance of City Planning Commissions within Municipalities, and Prescribing Their Powers and Duties," approved May 21, 1915, and any amendments thereto.

SECTION 2. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance, and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, and thereupon and thereafter this ordinance shall be in full force and effect.
