(Continued from Page 1) situation in this district was revealed by March reports of sales of 194 wholesale firms engaged in 11 lines of business. Total values of sales of these firms was 1.8 per cent greater than in March, 1924, whereas corresponding figures for February, 1925, were 8 per cent smaller than for February, 1924.

Loans Increase

Total loans and investments of 70 reporting member banks in nine cities of the Twelfth Federal Reserve District increased by \$34,000,000 or 2.2 per cent during the four weeks ending April 8, 1925, chiefly as a result of increases in collateral loans and in investment holdings. Commercial loans declined slightly during this period.

If the royalists hope that Hindenburg will be a chair-warmer for the Hohenzollerns and that a dictatorship will come soon, to be followed by a real return to the old order, they may be mistaken. The whole trend of history is toward democratization of institutions. There may be temporary setbacks, such as the rise of Napoleon and the return of the Bourbons between the French Revolution and the formation of the republic, but such reversions are short-lived.

WIFE SAVERS BY MRS. MARY MORTON

CARE OF COPPER, BRASS OR BRONZE The tarnish on copper, brass or bronze is copper carbonate. It may be removed by friction or it may be dissolved in weak acids.

Parts of an old bedspread may be utilized in making washcloths. Cut in squares and hem or crochet around the edge.

Use adhesive tape to cover the holes in your salt and pepper shakers instead of corks.

Angel's Delight.—One pint of whipped cream, pinch salt, one-half cup sugar, one teaspoon vanilla, two-thirds cup chopped English walnut meats, one cup marshmallows cut in small pieces, one-half cup candied cherries cut in half. Mix all into whipped cream. This dessert is better if put in a cool place for several hours to set. It is even good next day.

Lemon Rice Pudding.—To two cups of well boiled rice add the following sauce: Juice and grated rind of one lemon, three-quarters cup hot water, two tablespoons butter, one tablespoon cornstarch, yolk of egg, three-quarters cup sugar, pinch of salt. Put water in double boiler, add juice of lemon, salt and butter. Dissolve starch in a little water and add to mixture as it comes to a boil. When thoroughly cooked add beaten yolk of egg and sugar.

Cheese Souffle.—One-half cup American cheese (grated), one-quarter cup flour, three eggs, one-quarter cup butter, salt, paprika, one cup milk, one teaspoon onion juice. Prepare white sauce with flour, butter and milk in double boiler. Add cheese and cook, stirring till thick. Add beaten yolks of three eggs, salt, paprika and onion juice. Mix and fold in stiffly beaten whites. Turn into buttered baking dish and set that in a pan of water in a hot oven and bake until firm.

Baked Apples.—Pare and core apples. Stuff cavity with dates and nuts, sugar and bake. Make a sugar syrup and pour over when cool, or serve with cream.

Swiss Steak.—Get a thick round steak, cut in pieces, brown over a hot fire, cover with water, and let simmer on the stove for about an hour and a half, flavoring this with a small onion.

Pear Salad Supreme.—On a lettuce leaf place a round of pineapple, top this with half a pear, and surround the pear with cream cheese thinned with cream and run through a pastry tube.


