World's Champ Deep Sea Diver Here Saturday

Arthur Loeb, Hero of Eastland Disaster, at Torrance Theatre

Arthur Loeb of Chicago, champion diver of the world, hero of the Eastland disaster, will be the feature attraction at the Torrance



theatre Saturday. Loeb claims to be the only man living with a fractured skull and a bursted blood vessel in his head.

Saving 38 lives and recovering 68 bodies is Loeb's record in the Eastland disaster. He was standing on the Clark Street bridge when he heard two girls scream. Rushing to the edge of the bridge, he plunged into the water. For 72 hours, never out of the water for more than five minutes, he worked. One trip into the water proved almost fatal when his head struck the hull of the ship, fracturing his skull. He was unconscious for 29 hours. He recovered and now weighs 228 pounds. Loeb holds 138 solid gold medals for his rescue work.
