that the city is to receive a hundred-foot strip of land without cost from the Dominguez Land Corporation under the present plan for paving Redondo Boulevard, continued Trustee Brooks, "and that, due to present conditions, the cost of paving is much lower than it probably will be at a later date. All the members of the board who were present voted in favor of overriding the protests, and the city clerk was instructed to advertise for bids. The work is to be done under the direction of the city engineer.

ABANDON LIGHTING
In the case of the street lighting proposal, Mr. Brooks stated, the committee felt that the petition against the lighting system represented the wishes of a much larger share of the people in the city. The lighting protest was signed by over 300 voters from all walks of life and in every section of the city. For this reason, the committee recommended that the lighting proceedings be abandoned at this time.

The ceremonies Thursday, at which 1,050 received honors, were open to the public and began at 4:30, the academic procession having taken place an hour earlier.
