## Flowers and Flags Trim Table on Glorious Fourth

When you entertain for the "Glorious Fourth," whether informally or formally, the patriotic colors, red, white and blue, must of course have a conspicuous place in the decorations. Suppose you entertain a small party for evening or late afternoon dinner and then drive out to see the nearest civic display of fireworks or perchance to some cool pavilion fanned by the lake or ocean breeze, and dance.

Flowers are always the most effective centerpiece. In this case we will choose red poppies, blue-bells and white daisies. Of course they will be the real flowers if possible, but barring that we can make very presentable substitutes from crepe paper according to the directions in the booklet we get with the materials. Another appropriate touch shown above is the cutout eagles, pasted on cardboard

and with the tips of the wings tied together with ribbon around the bouquet of flowers. Runners of red, white and blue paper add a festive note to the white tablecloth, and the candleholders are shields of stars and stripes tied together with red ribbon. The nut cups are covered with fringed white paper with a cutout Uncle Sam guarding the contents. Wee flags are stuck into small wooden discs to mark each place, and you may substitute patriotic paper napkins for the usual linen if you wish. Appropriate paper lanterns and another suggestion for a place card are right and left above.

Now for the menu. I would suggest either a fruit cocktail or a jellied soup for the first course. Then, if you are the ordinary hostess who has to be chief cook as well, I believe I would serve either cold or warmed-over ham that you have cooked the day before. Boil it until it is tender, remove the skin, then cover the outside with brown sugar, mustard or paprika,

and bake until a nice brown. A few minutes in the oven will warm it through just before it is brought to the table, and you may serve it with scalloped or creamed potatoes, Pickles, olives, jellies and radishes are always acceptable with this course, then a fruit or vegetable salad, depending on whether or not you serve fruit for a fruit course. Of course you may serve a second vegetable if you wish, but it is unnecessary and the hostess-cook might as well save herself the extra labor.

The usual ice cream and cake may and the meal, or ice cream served in muskmelons—a la Lillian Russell, as it is called, as that famous old-time stage favorite invented the dish. Or you may make individual berry tarts and serve them a la mode. Most people like a hot drink with such a meal, even if the weather is a bit warm, so I would serve strong, hot coffee last; but have plenty of good cool water on hand also.

### Superior Completes Drilling Here; Buys Richfield Property

The Superior Oil Company has purchased 88 acres in proven territory in the Richfield oil field, and contemplates an immediate drilling program to develop its holdings, it is announced by officials of the company. The land is located on the east side of the field, and comprises land formerly held by the General Petroleum Corporation, which completed two wells on the property, and quit-claimed all the land except the two wells.

The development of a deep oil zone in this field by the Chiksan Oil Company, the Standard Oil Company, and the Petroleum Midway Company has resulted in the extension of the proven limits of the field, and the Superior's new lease is considered practically proven by these operations. By the terms of the Superior's lease the first well must be started within 90 days, but it is officially reported that drilling will start in considerably less time.

The Superior Oil Company has completed its drilling program in the Torrance-Lomita field, but it is expected that the company will be producing from its local wells for several years.

### P. E. Shops Here Making New Cars For Mt. Lowe Trip

Modernized and more comfortable cars are shortly to be used by the Pacific Electric Railway Company in its Mt. Lowe service between Los Angeles and Rubio Canyon, according to announcement by the railway's management yesterday. One of ten newly redesigned cars, fitted and equipped especially for this service, made its first trip today. Nine other cars are now in course of completion at the Torrance shops of the company.

At an expenditure of \$35,000 the redesigned cars are practically new in every respect. Special motors and control equipment have been installed, open sections have been enclosed, providing a smoking section, new comfortable seats installed, and other improvements made looking to comfort of passengers. The cars, seating 52 passengers, are of larger capacity than city type cars formerly used. The remainder of cars will shortly be completed and out in service.
