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Says U. S. Must Cut Labor Waste Or Europe Will Win Commerce

WASTE of human labor is a serious handicap to the industries of this country in the struggle for the world's markets, in the opinion of Lawrence W. Wallace, executive secretary of the American Engineering Council.

Wallace, who actively directed the "Assay of Waste" sponsored by the Engineering Council under the leadership of Herbert Hoover, has just completed a study of several years, during which he gathered an immense amount of data on industrial waste, both in America and Europe.

"It is evident," he says, "that if American industry is to hold its position in world trade it must eliminate the enormous waste occurring, and that can best be done by extending and intensifying the management function."

Immigrant Check Cuts Supply "European industry has an unlimited supply of cheap labor. We have a limited supply, and labor in America is paid more in real money than anywhere in the world."

"The net gain each year under the restricted immigration policy will be about 180,000 workers, as compared with approximately 1,000,000 each year during the four or five years preceding the war."

The Only Remedy "The only way to offset this loss and to maintain the standard of wages paid in the United States is to extend the use of material-handling and processing machinery and eliminate the waste of human labor due to accidents, illness, and the intermittent operation of industry."

"The situation with reference to high wages and limited supply of labor can also be met by more uniform production schedules. A large number of our basic industries are idle from 30 to 40 percent of the working days per year."
