## Cornerstone of Odd Fellows Temple Will Be Laid Sunday

Uppermost in the thoughts of all local Odd Fellows and Rebekahs since the institution of the Triple City and Trio Lodges has been "a home of our own." To that end they have worked untiringly, and the laying of the cornerstone of the new temple next Sunday, Aug. 2, will mark the realization of their ideal.

The new building, financed through the co-operation of G. C. Wharton, a member of the I. O. O. F., and the Lomita Odd Fellows Building Association, is on Redondo-Wilmington boulevard. The first floor is divided into three store rooms. On the second floor are lodge room, banquet room and kitchen, ladies' reception room, gentlemen's reading room, and parlor.

**Will Answer Demand**  
The new building will fill a long-felt need in Lomita—provide a suitable place for lodge and social events and entertainments of all kinds.

A brief outline of the history of the two organizations will not be amiss, since copies of this issue of The News will be sealed in the cornerstone.

E. R. Longley, then secretary of American Lodge No. 385, and Wm. T. Blakely, of Lodge No. 385, were instrumental in organizing Triple City Lodge No. 333. At that time Mr. Blakely, was district deputy grand master of District 85.

Longley later (1923-24) was grand master of California. Grand Master K. C. Keene instituted the lodge December 28, 1920, with a charter membership of 16, and the officers were installed by C. Brown, district deputy grand master of District 98.

The present membership of 110 includes residents of Lomita, Torrance, Harbor City, and Gardena. The first noble grand was J. W. Hanselman, followed by E. W. Brumpton, J. H. Beckham, Walter Tappin Jr., E. T. Curran, M. P. Richey, W. M. Straub, N. I. Beckham, and Carl Ross, junior noble grand.

Triple City Lodge was honored in 1921 by the appointment of E. W. Brumpton as district deputy grand master of District No. 98, under Grand Master James Ryan Jr.

**History of Body**  
The Lomita Odd Fellows Building Association was organized by William T. Blakely in 1923, and is capitalized at \$50,000. The officers of the association are: E. W. Brumpton, president; J. H. Beckham, vice-president; Walter Tappin Jr., secretary and treasurer; C. P. Parquhar and W. C. Bright, also members of the executive board.

Trio Rebekah Lodge No. 240 was instituted November 30, 1921, by Mary N. Pierce, grand warden, assisted by Stella Merrick, past president of California, and the officers were installed by Carlotta Foot, district deputy president of District 84, with 25 charter members. Thirteen members were initiated the night of the institution. The present membership is 101.

Estella Groves was the first noble grand, and was followed by Marshall Tappin, Marcella Brumpton, Ada E. Anderson, Ella B. Miller, Gertrude Beckham, and Olga M. Terry.
