she up and slapped them. Hurrah for Mrs. Murphy! Those Bavarians should learn that they cannot insult an American named Murphy.

I DO not wish to leave a wrong impression. The treatment we received in Germany—outside of Bavaria—was splendid. Most intelligent Germans bear no malice toward Americans. But in Munich it is different. They hate us. And they tell us so, bluntly, insultingly, nastily.

Perhaps it is because all Munichers are suffering from chronic constipation induced by the daily consumption of too much heavy beer and too many heavier sausages. So let's be charitable, and satisfy ourselves by cheering the Mrs. Murphys.

If you think the governor of an American commonwealth has an easy job consider the difficulties that Gov. Friend Richardson now faces. The governor is confronted with the task of selecting eight municipal judges in Los Angeles. That sounds simple. But to these eight benches there are 125 active aspirants. That makes it difficult. There will be 120 disappointed attorneys when the appointments are made. Which cannot add to the peace of mind of California's chief executive. For among the 128 there probably are at least 25 who would make good judges. The other 103 probably wouldn't—but the very characteristics that make them ineligible for the bench will prompt them to make political trouble for the governor.


