WIFE SAVERS BY MRS. MARY MORTON

Swedish Loaf.—Take one and one-quarter pounds beef, one-half pound veal, one-quarter pound pork ground together, one beaten egg, three-quarters cup bread crumbs, pepper, salt, one and one-half cups milk, a little finely chopped onion (which has been fried in fat). Put egg, milk and bread crumbs together. Let stand ten minutes to soften, put in ground meat and work all together. Season with salt, pepper and the

onion. It must be kneaded well to be good. Put molded loaf in baking pan, with melted fat in pan and a piece of butter on top of meat. When loaf is brown put in a little water and bake. Time required for baking, 45 minutes.

Gingerbread.—Take three tablespoons butter, one-half cup sugar, one-half cup molasses, one beaten egg, one teaspoon cinnamon, one-half teaspoon ginger, one teaspoon soda, one-half cup lukewarm water. Cream, butter or other shortening, and sugar; add beaten egg, then molasses. Mix flour, soda and spices. To the creamed mixture add a little water, then part of the flour; continue till all flour and water are used. Bake in shallow pan.

ICE BOX ECONOMY
Watchfulness in keeping the refrigerator door latched will save ice. To open the door or cover unnecessarily should be avoided. Cold storage which is actually low in temperature and cold is necessary for safe food preservation in warm weather.

In taking the baby out of doors, especially in colder weather, one should watch that the sun does not shine in his face, should shield his face and head from the wind and be sure that his feet are warm and that he is properly and warmly dressed.

Allowing the baby to sleep on the porch or veranda assures health for him. A clothesline hung across the porch and a heavy blanket hung over it make an excellent wind or sun shield for the baby's bed.

Remember that fresh air renews and purifies the blood and is as necessary to growing children as proper food.

A little ammonia in the bath will keep the skin healthy, fine and fresh looking.

Macaroni.—Cook the macaroni in salted water until very tender. Drain and blanch. Beat two eggs thoroughly, add two tablespoons milk and turn into a hot, well buttered skillet. At once add the prepared macaroni, stir, then allow to fry until a golden brown. There is no need of heating the oven for its preparation—a thing worth considering in summer time.
