

Dinosaurs at the Torrance

"The Lost World," a picturization of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's novel of prehistoric monsters and modern lovers, which is to be shown at the Torrance Theatre next Sunday and Monday, has aroused national comment as to the possibilities of man's origin.

The photodrama, in which Bessie Love, Lewis Stone, Wallace Beery and Lloyd Hughes are co-featured, presupposes that there is a lost inner-continent near the upper reaches of the Amazon River which

Time has forgotten. As Doyle penned the story, monsters of the Jurassic Age, ten million years ago, continue to live, to battle each other, and to terrorize the area.

Man is unknown there until the party of adventurers, bent upon proving the existence of prehistoric monsters still on earth, arrive on the magic plateau. After witnessing deadly duels between the strange monsters of the past ages—the allosaurus, brontosaurus, tyrannosaurus, triceratops, dactyl, stegosaurus and others—they finally capture a brontosaurus bigger than a dozen elephants, and raft him back to London. Their objective is to prove to doubting scientists of the English metropolis that they have really discovered a lost world.

The monster, however, escapes from his steel cage and, after wrecking a portion of London's downtown district, finally crashes through London bridge and is last seen swimming down the Thames toward the Atlantic.

Seven years of tedious work were required to film the strange picture.

The reincarnation of the monsters was accurate, according to scientific findings dug from prehistoric formations of the Rocky Mountains. These formations revealed not alone the size of the monsters, but their gigantic features as well. It was upon these discoveries that the great beasts of the picture were brought back to life, after a sleep of a hundred thousand centuries.

Chaplin Double Will Appear In Person Tonight

Charlie Amador, the double for Charlie Chaplin and the man who brought about a court litigation, will make his personal appearance at the Lomita Theatre in vaudeville tonight, together with a comedy that was made with Amador as the principal. 


