#### ELECTION PROCLAMATION

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the qualified electors of the district hereinafter described, situated in the County of Los Angeles, State of California, that an election will be held in said district on the 17th day of October, 1925, for the purpose of determining whether said district shall be incorporated, to be designated by the name of "Lomita County Water District," with boundaries as follows:

Beginning at the northeasterly corner of Tract No. 222, as shown on map recorded in Book 13, page 177 of Maps, records of Los Angeles County; thence southerly in a direct line to the northeasterly corner of Lot 14, of Tract No. 3516, as shown on map recorded in Book 38, page 26 of Maps, records of said county; thence westerly in a direct line to the northwesterly corner of Lot 8, said last mentioned tract; thence southwesterly in a direct line to the southeasterly corner of Lot 6 of Tract No. 4263, as shown on map recorded in Book 55, page 39 of Maps, records of said county; thence westerly in a direct line through the southwesterly corner of Lot 10, said last mentioned tract, to the center line of Eshelman Avenue, as shown on map of Tract No. 848, recorded in Book 16, pages 90 and

Said election will be held in the office of No. 4 Water Company, on Miller Avenue, between Narbonne Avenue and Oak Street, in said district, and the polls will be opened at six o'clock in the morning of the said day of election and will be kept open until seven o'clock in the afternoon of said day, at which time said polls will be closed.

The following qualified electors of said proposed district have been appointed officers of election to conduct the election: IN-SPECTION, Charles E. Trotman; JUDGES, Margaret Radcliffe, and Robert M. Brown; CLERKS, Mildred E. Trotman, Walter Tappin, Sr., and George W. Hippensteel.

The proposition to be submitted at said election will be: "Shall the proposition to organize 'Lomita County Water District' under Chapter 52 of the Acts of the fortieth session of the California Legislature and amendments thereto be adopted?" and the ballots to be used at such election will contain the said proposition, followed in a separate column by the words "yes" and "no" placed one above the other and each followed on the right by a voting square.

Persons voting at such election shall stamp a cross (X) in the voting square at the right of the word "yes" or of the word "no" (as the case may be), to indicate when they vote for or against the proposition submitted.

The said election will be conducted in the manner provided by law in respect to the general elections, so far as the same may be applicable.

All persons resident within said proposed district who possess all the qualifications required of electors under the general laws of the State of California shall be entitled to vote at said election.


