The evening class in dressmaking will meet at the school building next Wednesday from 7 to 9.


The Women's Missionary Society of the Central Church will have a food sale Saturday, Sept. 26, at American Fruit Market. It will begin at 10:30.

## Extension Course Now Offered in Diesel Engines

Diesel engines is a new subject offered for the first time this year by the State University Extension Division through evening class work. The course includes a brief history of the development in internal combustion engines, the two and four-stroke cycle types, the Diesel principle, solid jet and air injection of fuels, oils and their calorific values, thermal efficiency, general principles of engine designs, etc. The instructor, James Marsh, holds a certificate from the United States department of commerce, steamboat inspection service, as chief engineer of vessels propelled by gas, fluid, naphtha or electrical motors. He is rated as grade 1, and his fourth certificate, having been in the work twenty years. The class will meet on Friday 7 to 9 p. m., in room 614, Hillstreet building, 815 South Hill street, Los Angeles.
